A welcome return event was the always popular Joe Studholme Memorial Vintage and Classic Car Day held on Sunday 26 February in North Canterbury.

About 20 cars made the sojourn, including several modern and classic Jaguars, a Porsche 928, a Ferrari 330GT, an R type Bentley, TVR Griffith, Triumph Stag, a Triumph TR6, a very pretty Citroen GSA Pallas, a 1953 Lincoln, 1957 Chrysler 300, and a couple of gallant soft tops (Morris 8 sports, and Austin 12/4). There was also a magnificent T922 RR Silver Ghost which was New Zealand new and owned by an Auckland publishing family, before being re-bodied by Gulf Motor Bodies in Auckland.

Other sheds were resplendent with an accumulation of household memorabilia, and farm machinery that reminded us of our childhoods.

While there, architect and author Alec Bruce presented a signed copy of his book, *Architectural Drawings of Christ's College*, to our host. The book documents the buildings of Christ's College, pre and post-earthquake.

Next stop was Saddlewood, just past Hawarden, where hosts Richard and Anita Todd kindly allowed a rather bedraggled party of 50-plus people to lunch inside their lovely home.

Rod Buchanan presented the Todds with another signed copy of *Architectural Drawings of Christ's College*, and gave a short history of the Joe Studholme event, now in its 20th year.
